

Wikipedia: **Petro Prokopovych** (1775–1850, <u>Ukrainian</u>: Петро Прокопович) was a revolutionary <u>Ukrainian</u>^{[1][2][3][4]} beekeeper, the founder of commercial <u>beekeeping</u> and the inventor of the first movable frame hive.^[5] He introduced novelties in traditional beekeeping that allowed great progress in the practice. Among his most important inventions was a <u>hive frame</u> in a separate honey chamber of his <u>beehive</u>. He also invented a crude <u>queen</u>

excluder between brood and honey chambers. [6][7] Petro Prokopovych was also the first to ever model a 'bee beard' after delineating and calculating 'bee swarm behaviour", inspiring students for generations. [8]

From http://beekeeping.com.ua: Petro Prokopovych was born in Ukraine, in the village of Mytchenky, near Baturyn, where he spent his childhood. The parents sent eleven-years-old Petro to Kiev-Mohyla Academy, where he studied for eight years.

South Carolina Statewide Honey Pollen Analysis

In early 2021, South Carolina Beekeepers Association (SCBA) began thinking about conducting a South Carolina statewide honey pollen analysis. Work on the Congaree River basin honey pollen analysis (Melissopalynology) was completed in 2021 and an article was submitted to *Palynology*.

For the Congaree River basin, we collected fresh honey during 2020 and analyzed the pollen in the honey to determine what nectar sources were contributing to the honey. The Congaree study was extremely successful, and we decided to replicate the Congaree study on a South Carolina statewide basis. South Carolina is the first state to do a honey pollen analysis on a statewide basis to determine what comprises our honey. The analysis will also help determine what to plant in the various parts of the state when bees forage. We will also observe what plants are blooming when we collect the weekly nectar. This will help the universities quickly identify the pollen sources.

Beekeeper's Checklist + Things to Know

Extraction Services:

MSBA Member, **Danny Cannon**, located at **1437 Jessamine Rd in Lexington** will extract honey for beekeepers for \$5 per box with a \$20 minimum. **Call Danny to schedule a time to bring your boxes to be extracted. 803.600.4576.**

A checklist for every Beekeeper... especially new beekeepers!

- A 2 gallon feed pail/bucket We need to start feeding sugar syrup: \$8-\$10 + shipping (Betterbee has them). We recommend buying 2 buckets. This is a better solution than internal frame feeders or boardman feeders that fit into the hive entrance, especially in the winter.
- A metal smoker box about \$35 + shipping. This is to put your lighted smoker in after use. You also need to get a cork (Lowes or Home Depot in their hardware drawers) or rag to plug

the smoker so you will have charred pine straw that is easy to light (W.T. Kelley makes them)

- Folding veils (easy to store) with the long strings and helmets \$25 for a veil +\$15 for the helmet. (Dadant carries them). Long sleeve bee gloves (Buck o has them for about \$12 a pair) of the correct size
- Buy a canvas/cloth large laundry bag (Wal Mart or Amazon) to put pine straw that has been mowed/run over to make soft for your smoker fuel. This should be stored in a very dry place so it lights easily.
- A 2" or 3" paint brush and a double boiler/crock pot to melt beeswax and coat the frames after scraping dead bees out. *Note: Beeswax is very flammable!* We recommend 2/3 pound of wax for 8 medium frames. You probably have deep & medium frames about \$8/pound at Dadant.
- Use high quality paint your hive(s). **Paint only the outside** and leave the inside for the bees to coat with propolis.
- Make sure everyone wears light colored clothing. **No dark fuzzy clothing!** Blue jeans are ok. Long sleeve shirts. Do we have veils and gloves for everyone? *If an experienced beekeeper wears blue jeans and a tan/light long sleeve shirt with a collar, white socks with covered toe shoes/boots, you will only need the veils/gloves. This is cheaper than the bee suits with attached veils. *New beekeepers are encouraged to buy the jacket with veil until they feel comfortable enough to not need it.*


