June Speaker: James Craig Topic: Cutouts / Relocations

Speaker Bio

I have a 44+ year background in health care..was a clinician/educator/medical equipment company owner...sold that in 2012, opened Striped Pig Distillery in Charleston, selling it in 2019.

I started beekeeping in 2013 without a class or a clue. I bought 4 colonies of bees and woodenware, then lost three of the four during the winter. I found and joined Charleston Beekeepers Association (CABA) in the spring of 2014, borrowed a book, found someone to

watch me inspect my hive,and passed the certified beekeeper level. I also joined the CABA swarm team and found I had an affinity for bee relocations, completing 60+ in the first year. In 2015, knowing everything there was to know about bees, I sat for the Journeyman exams at Clemson. I followed that with the Master exam in 2017 at Florence, SC. Somewhere along the way, I found I knew very little about bees...still don't. I've enjoyed wrangling honey bees from natural, residential and commercial structures since 2014, donating more than 500 colonies to area beekeepers and non-profits groups. I average more than 1 honey bee colony relocation each week during the year, beginning around the middle of February, and into November...last year for example was 74 relocations. I have learned much about the behavior of feral colonies doing these.

From the President . . .

If you were at the last meeting, you know that we voted on some big-ticket items. If you were not there, what happened and why.

As president, I am also part of the executive leadership committee for the Midstate Beekeepers Association. In addition to our monthly meeting, we meet to discuss

issues that are not primarily educational, such as: expenses, finance, opportunities and growth.

To say the last three years have not been unprecedented would be an understatement. Attendance at our meetings dropped to zero as we were forced to meet virtually. Over time, we have been allowed to meet in person and obtained a new venue. Attendance is about a third of what it was in past. The overall number of people involved in beekeeping has dropped as well.

Without members and new beekeepers, we will not have an association. The executive leadership has floated ideas of mugs and t-shirts to promote our organization. Our specific tax-exempt status does not allow us to "sell" these items, but they can be given away to members. Leadership thought these were good initial ideas to promote our club as the t-shirts could be given to new members and to members as they volunteered. We would need to get ideas from local artists on potential logos and submit these to the members for approval.

In the midst of this, our past president, Danny Cannon, approached me to sponsor the state meeting here in Columbia. Danny is now the president of the State Beekeepers Association and understands the issues of our club as well as all clubs within South Carolina. Leadership had talked about supporting the state meeting, and we were going to bring this up to members. However, I realized that there were only two meetings before the state meeting in July, and one of them was just days away. After a few emails and telephone calls, the executive leadership felt like Midstate should support the state meeting. This was a unanimous consensus. I agreed to present this to our members without notifying them via our newsletter or word or mouth (the monthly newsletter had been sent out already,) it was considered that important.

The reasons for supporting the state meeting are obvious: it is in Columbia, attendees will be primarily from here, supporting the State association supports us, having a presence in the meeting with let local people know that there is local beekeeping organization. The t-shirt idea will just add to our presence at the meeting. The drawback is that this will be a major expense (~\$8000 -- \$5000 State Conference + \$3000 t-shirts) and we will need to step up as an organization to pull this off.

I personally apologize to any members who felt this was hurried or out of line. This is a unique opportunity for our group and our entire leadership thought these were good ideas to pursue. *We will repeat the presentation at the next meeting for another

vote, just to make sure that the initial enthusiasm persists. Members will be able to ask questions.

Midlands Beekeeping Calendar for June by Red Maple



All beekeeping is local. These chores are for the Midlands of South Carolina. During early June the nectar flow ends with only a few location exceptions. Robbing becomes a concern as nectar becomes scarce. You will notice the bees wash boarding on the front of the hive and around entrances. It's as though they don't have anything to do other than wait at the entrance rocking back and forth. Populations are very large now and consume a great deal of food. Good weather and long days are ideal for foraging – if only there was nectar available. The early rising beekeeper may note that the bees fly with more enthusiasm during the morning hours. But as the heat increases and the nectar dries up fewer bees forage as the day progresses.

MSBA Extractor Rental

Harvesting Honey?

Mid-State Beekeepers Association has a powered extractor for use by members.

Rental is \$5 per day with a two-day minimum. A \$50 refundable cleaning and damage deposit is required on pickup. The additional honey this powered unit will extract from the comb more than pays its rental fee. A heated capping knife, and strainers are also available with the extractor if needed.

Members will need to obtain their own food grade buckets. We can direct you to these locally or you may be able to get them at local bakeries, food service establishments, etc. *The quartermaster for the MSBA extractor is Jeannine and Neal Taylor-To reserve the extractor, you may click here to email them directly:* nealtaylor@gmail.com

Things You Need to Know

Extraction Services:

MSBA Member, **Danny Cannon**, located at **1437 Jessamine Rd in Lexington** will extract honey for beekeepers for \$5 per box with a \$20 minimum. **Call Danny to schedule a time to bring your boxes to be extracted. 803.600.4576.**

A checklist for every Beekeeper... especially new beekeepers!

- A 2 gallon feed pail/bucket We need to start feeding sugar syrup: \$8-\$10 + shipping (Betterbee has them). We recommend buying 2 buckets. This is a better solution than internal frame feeders or boardman feeders that fit into the hive entrance, especially in the winter.
- A metal smoker box about \$35 + shipping. This is to put your lighted smoker in after use. You also need to get a cork (Lowes or Home Depot in their hardware drawers) or rag to plug the smoker so you will have charred pine straw that is easy to light (W.T. Kelley makes them)
- Folding veils (easy to store) with the long strings and helmets \$25 for a veil +\$15 for the helmet. (Dadant carries them). Long sleeve bee gloves (Buck o has them for about \$12 a pair) of the correct size
- Buy a canvas/cloth large laundry bag (Wal Mart or Amazon) to put pine straw that has been mowed/run over to make soft for your smoker fuel. This should be stored in a very dry place so it lights easily.
- A 2" or 3" paint brush and a double boiler/crock pot to melt beeswax and coat the frames after scraping dead bees out. *Note: Beeswax is very flammable!* We recommend 2/3 pound of wax for 8 medium frames. You probably have deep & medium frames about \$8/pound at Dadant.
- Use high quality paint your hive(s). **Paint only the outside** and leave the inside for the bees to coat with propolis.
- Make sure everyone wears light colored clothing. **No dark fuzzy clothing!** Blue jeans are ok. Long sleeve shirts. Do we have veils and gloves for everyone? *If an experienced beekeeper wears blue jeans and a tan/light long sleeve shirt with a collar, white socks with covered toe shoes/boots, you will only need the veils/gloves. This is cheaper than the bee suits with attached veils. *New beekeepers are encouraged to buy the jacket with veil until they feel comfortable enough to not need it.*


